Caroline Rescued From Pool

WASHINGTON (AP)—Caroline Kennedy, 3, daughter of the President, got into water over her head in a hotel's swimming pool a week ago and was rescued by a young woman who jumped into the pool fully clothed.

Caroline suffered no ill-effects, her father said. Mrs. William Salinger, who is reporting a child in the news fall, said the incident is the daughter-in-law of Sen. Everett S. Robinson III.

The White House confirmed the incident today after the Evening Star published a story about it written by society columnist Betty Blech.

The episode was at the suburban Maryland home of Mr. and Mrs. Newton I. Spera Jr. Airport was a recent visitor. Despite what there for a birthday swim party for Ivan Spera, 3 Mrs. Kennedy was not along.

White House press secretary Pierre Salinger said that Caroline was splashing around in the pool on an inflatable ring and slipped out of it.

"Mrs. Robinson jumped in and pulled her out," he said. "It was not a serious matter. Despite what all around watching. She was out of the pool in seconds."

Apparently, Salinger said, Caroline wasn't even swimming. She was enough to swallow any water, and, in any event, showed no ill-effects.
